Our Bars: Community, Safety, Violence, Sex, and Activism

Thursday, January 26

Bars and clubs have long been gathering places where people found like-minded companionship and social circles. This was particularly the case as LGBTQ communities coalesced in Chicago. Join community activist and Sidetrack owner Art Johnston and other long-standing community members as they discuss how a movement developed out of a few watering holes. The panel will talk about how bars in Chicago, since the 1950s and earlier, have been places of community and safety, sometimes broken by police violence and often determined by politics of gender and race.



Art, AIDS, and Activism in Chicago

Friday, March 3

How was art used to speak out about the AIDS pandemic, advocate for its victims, and critique public response to this health crisis? Drawing on two exhibitions on view in Chicago—ArtAIDSAmerica at the Alphawood Gallery and One day this kid will get larger at the DePaul Art Museum—this panel examines artists who participated as activists in the AIDS crisis and contemporary artists responding to that time and to ongoing HIV health issues.

From New Town to Boystown to Lake View

Thursday, May 18

This program explores the triumphs of the nation's first officially recognized gay village, born of activism in 1970 when residents marched here in Chicago's first Pride Parade. It also examines the neighborhood's underlying social tensions—historic and current—between the different groups of people who live, work, and play in Boystown, asking the question, "Whose neighborhood is it, anyway?"

Now that marriage equality is the law of the land and childrearing is more common in the LGBTQ community, are we becoming too integrated into mainstream society? How did we define ourselves as LGBTQ and have those identities changed today? Jennifer Brier moderates a diverse panel of Ricardo Gamboa, Yasmin Nair, Francesca Royster, and Joseph Varisco as they ask—and answer—these essential questions in a series of witty and fast-paced presentations followed by a debate.

Standing Up: From Punch Line to Spotlight

Thursday, March 10

Chicago has been the longtime epicenter of comedy, often at the expense of a marginalized LGBTQ community. While views have progressed, LGBTQ people still serve as the punch line for jokes across the comedic spectrum. Performer Abby McEneny moderates a panel that includes Second City's Andy Eninger, historian E. Patrick Johnson, and writer Jason Heidemann for a discussion on the history and struggle of queerness in Chicago's comedy scene as well as who has been at the forefront of humorous performances and roles. This enriching program showcases the comedic talents of our panelists and gay sketch comedy troupe GayCo.

Looking? The History of Hooking Up

Thursday, May 19

Join Brian Mustanski as he moderates a talk with Jeremy Foreshew of Grindr, and academics Michelle Birkett and Jody Ahlm about the social and historical development of hooking up. From face-to-face meetings in bars, club scenes, and bandana culture to early online chat



rooms, dating websites, and mobile apps, this conversation explores how interactions in these environments have progressed and how the LGBTQ community navigates intimacy, self-identity, and self-presentation in cyberspace.

Transmopolitan: Transgender Resilience

January 22

Diverse voices and stories from Chicago's robust transgender community. Trans activist Precious Davis presents a multimedia project on Chicago's transgender history which includes her solo talk about the resilience needed to stand up as a transgender woman. Davis then leads a multi-generational panel discussion with members of the trans community including Andre Perez, Gloria Allen, Owen Daniel McCarter, Mimi Marks, and Angelica Ross.

Secret Loves: Before We Could Ask or Tell

March 26

Previous generations of LGBT military personnel risked violence, ridicule and disciplinary action by seeking love in the service. Jim Darby, Susan Heggeland, and Marquell Smith tell their personal stories; Megan Carney shares what she learned while writing *Women at War* for Rivendell Theatre Ensemble; and performance artist Travis presents musical entertainment. The Chicago History Museum's exhibition *The Secret Lives of Objects* will be open for viewing during the reception time.

OUT at CHM presents StoryCorps OutLoud

May 7

StoryCorps founder David Isay presents stories from the OutLoud initiative, a project dedicated to recording and preserving the experiences of the LGBTQ community. A multiple Peabody Award winner and MacArthur Fellow, Isay will share our community's stories and will be in conversation with UIC gender and women's studies professor Dr. Jennifer Brier to talk about OutLoud's evolution and how it relates to long standing LGBT oral history projects.
